#### Malborough with South Huish C of E (VC) Primary School



'The roots to grow, the wings to fly. All within the love of God'

Church was packed for our Mother's Day service; the children read out poems, the Reception children stole everyone's hearts when they explained to everyone why 'I love my Mummy.....", they all sang beautifully, and the Spiritual Detectives read the prayers and distributed the Mother's Day posies which the children had made in School that morning.

The school fundraised for Comic Relief by coming into school in mufti. Class 1 had a brilliant afternoon bug hunting as part of their mini beast topic. They found woodlice, spiders, snails, worms, flies, beetles, ladybirds, and even spotted a bumble bee.

Class 2 have been learning about shape in their maths lessons. They have studied and discussed a variety of shapes and made 3D models of some of them. They also enjoyed painting the cars they have constructed in the Design & Technology lessons.

Class 3 have been learning about levers and mechanisms in their DT lessons.

Class 4 in DT have been learning different joints they can use to create a strong base for their bird hides, and in PE they have learnt the importance of accuracy when fielding in cricket and put it into practice in a game that is a mixture pf netball, football, and cricket.

The whole school enjoyed a day at Buckfast Abbey, where KS1 took part in 'The Donkey's Tale' workshop in the Medieval Guest Hall. Here they learnt about the Easter story through the eyes of Solomon the donkey. Afterwards they had a tour of the abbey and then completed an Abbey Church Spotter Sheet in the Easter Resource Room. KS2 enjoyed a 'Threads of Easter' tour in the church followed by Easter Cross craft activities in the Education Centre. Their visit ended with a tour of the abbey's beautiful gardens.

The whole school enjoyed a visit from the Explorer Dome science workshops. They learnt about the wonders of space, exploreing our

planet, moon, sun and the solar system, immersing themselves in a hot rainforest, dry desert and freezing arctic.

It was lovely to see so many people in church for the Easter service. Classes 3 and 4 told the story of Easter and read the poem 'Tress' by Jan Edmunds, and classes 1 and 2 gave a word-perfect performance of 'Spring Chicken'. As always, the children were accompanied by Trevor Becker, and our church congregation very kindly offered teas and coffees before the service. A big thank you to everyone who supports our school in so many different ways.

We ended the Spring term with an afternoon of Spiritual activities: the children made cards, worked as a team, and participated in a yoga session. All activities were aimed at thinking about both ourselves and the wider world. A great moment to pause and reflect on the school term and also what lies ahead.

In early April we were treated to a fascinating talk by the photographer and retired vet, Stephen Powles. His wildlife photography was beautiful, but most astounding were the ingenious methods Stephen had used to obtain close-up shots of his subjects. These ranged from bats in



Kenya, rare pine martens in Scotland to animals much closer to his Devon home. There were fabulous shots of tawny owls, kingfishers and hedgehogs, among many others. We saw video footage from inside a hornets' nest in the wall of Stephen's house, watching them manufacturing their nest material from rotting wood, and were amazed at foxes scaling his wall in search of pears at night. There were even mice which had worked out how to defeat a humane trap. Apparently they love porridge oats and peanuts.

This was altogether a visual treat and a highly entertaining morning.

In May Chris Groves, the gardener at the National Trust Garden, Overbecks, will give us a virtual tour of the garden through the seasons. This is a hidden gem which is carved into the hillside 80 metres above the sea. Its extraordinary position not only provides breathtaking views but also allows tender plants to flourish, a fact the original owners were well aware of as they planted exotic and subtropical seeds.

This will be at Malborough Village Hall on May 24th at 10am. As usual, visitors will be most welcome .

### Salcombe D-Day 80th Commemoration 6th June 2024

On 6<sup>th</sup> June 2024, Salcombe will proudly commemorate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day with a series of events culminating in lighting a beacon at 9.15 pm. Between 3rd and 5th June 1944, a U.S. Navy Amphibious Force of 66 ships and six Royal Navy escorts sailed from Salcombe, tasked to land on Utah Beach, Normandy and help liberate enemy occupied Europe.

The D-Day 80th Commemoration Parade starting at 8.30 pm from the War Memorial outside Cliff House, will march to Whitestrand and assemble there for the Town Crier's Proclamation and welcome from Fr. Daniel French, Reveille and the Mayor's International Tribute, followed by lighting the beacon at 9.15 pm.

Inoculations are for over 75s and there are two appointment blocks for minibus passengers: 10.00-10.15 & 11.15-11.30. If you want to use the minibus, please call Margaret Moore 842006 to book a place. You do not need to call Redfern Health Centre to book an appointment – we will provide the list of minibus passengers to them. If enough demand, we may arrange another trip on 22/5. If under 75, but think you may still qualify for a jab, you must check this with the Health Centre.

Regrettably, the "Energy from Waste" plant tour at Devonport is cancelled: not enough people to make it worthwhile. Instead, we are going to an old favourite on 10/5: Widecombe in the Moor. We are not stopping at the House of Marbles but lunching at Ullacombe Farm, near Bovey, which was popular last time we visited. To confirm our booking, I need menu choices by 3/5, please. Margaret and I have the menu or Google "Ullacombe Farm". After lunch, you can have tea in Widecombe at the Café on the green or refreshments in the Old Inn, and then explore the historic Church. We'll come back along the ridge road to Princetown to enjoy the scenic views. Later in the year we plan to go again, stop at the House of Marbles and have lunch in the Old Inn.

A trip to the National Marine Aquarium in Plymouth is scheduled for 20/5. Tickets must be booked and an arrival time slot selected. Concessions (60+) tickets cost £23, so please let me or Margaret have this by 13/5, so I can buy the tickets which allow free return visits for 12 months. A certain amount of walking is involved but there is disabled access, and a limited number of manual wheelchairs. There is a gift shop and lunch is in the Waves café overlooking the Barbican or, weather permitting, an outside picnic area with sea views.

Monday 27/5 is a bank holiday, so the Age Concern lunch that week is on Tues 28/5.

Please book Wednesday supermarket & Thursday town runs on the clipboards available on the minibus and taken into the Over60s centre on Thursdays. Please call Margaret Moore (842006) if you want to book a place on any other day trips or want to make a last-minute booking change.







## The Maypole

Maypole dancing is a tradition on May Day, which is the first day of May. It is believed to have started in Roman Britain around 2,000 years ago, when soldiers celebrated the arrival of spring by dancing around decorated trees thanking their goddess Flora. These days dancers weave ribbons around a pole rather than a tree... 
